
### Curriculum Statement



Our Early Years curriculum is defined by the <u>Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)</u> Which sets out the seven areas of learning and the knowledge and skills children should be able to have by the end of the Early Years Foundation Stage (the Early Learning Goals).

At Dawpool C of E Primary School we use Development Matters as curriculum guidance. This non- statutory document provides the inspiration to our practise.

The Prime Areas are especially important as they form the foundation for all learning and future success.

At Dawpool, we prioritise building strong, supportive relationships and providing a language-rich environment filled with high-quality interactions. Our carefully planned experiences are designed to nurture children's confidence, develop their communication and language skills, and support their physical development. These foundations support all other learning and help children get ready for school and life. Without these early skills, it can be harder for children to make progress in reading, writing, maths, and other areas as they grow.


#### Curriculum Intent







**Centleness** The gentle approach required in nature-based learning nurtures gentleness in behaviour.


Self-Control Managing emotions, turn-taking and sharing promotes self-control

## Curriculum Theme



At Dawpool, our curriculum is designed around the engaging themes "Where in the World?" and "Once Upon a Time," We use high-quality books as a hook to inspire and deepen learning. We follow the children's interests, ensuring their curiosity leads the way, while maintaining a clear focus on sequential learning. Our approach builds on each child's individual starting points, progressively developing the skills and knowledge they need to make a confident and successful transition into Year 1.
